RESETTLEMENT WAVES TO CANADA

- 1776 Black Loyalists come to Canada to flee the oppression of the American Revolution
 1830 Polish refugees start fleeing to Canada to escape Russian oppression
 1891 Migration of 170,000 Ukrainians begin as a result of Austro-Hungarian rule
 1950 A significant influx of Middle Eastern and North African Jews flee to Canada
- 1970 7,000 Chilean & other Latin American Refugees permitted to stay in Canada after the overthrow of the Allende Government
- 1979 More than 60,000 "Boat People" find refuge in Canada after the Communist victory in the Vietnam War
- 1992 5,000 Bosnian Muslims admitted to Canada to escape the ethnic cleansing of the Yugoslav Civil War
- 2016 Canada resettles more than 40,000 Syrian Refugees








