City Background information

Bristol was delighted to be amongst the pioneer cities for this programme in the UK and is also proud to be a City of Sanctuary. We have a long history of welcoming migrants and refugees, and the Mayor is committed to making the city more inclusive and tackling inequality in all its forms. Bristol already has a huge range of provision to support the integration of newcomers, with many organisations and individuals deeply committed to this cause. These initiatives, however, are often under-resourced and disconnected from each other. The Inclusive Cities project therefore represented a unique opportunity to bring people together to take a strategic look at the inclusion of newcomers and how we can make sure that nobody falls through the cracks and everyone's efforts add up to more than the sum of their parts.

Case Study: Welcome Hubs

In response to the war in Ukraine and the Homes for Ukraine Scheme, Bristol has created an innovative model of Welcome Hubs to ensure wrap-around community support for refugees arriving in the city. Each Welcome Hub will provide a programme of social events, a team of volunteers willing to provide low-level resettlement support (e.g. helping people open bank accounts, showing them around the city, etc.) and space for Council-commissioned programmes such as English language and culture classes. In return, Welcome Hubs receive a small amount of funding from the Local Authority, and the Council and Hubs will share information on people arriving and their needs. 15 Hubs have been launched across the city, serving over 200 refugees per week. There are plans to share and develop this model beyond Bristol due to widespread interest from across the country. It is hoped that in time Welcome Hubs will find ways to serve refugee communities in the city beyond Ukrainians (e.g. Afghans in hotel accommodation).



INCLUSIVE CITIES

Inclusive Cities is a knowledge exchange initiative supporting UK cities and their local partners to achieve a step-change in their approach towards the inclusion of newcomers.

Drawing on innovative ideas and practices from Europe and the United States, Inclusive Cities aims to support the development of an approach to inclusion which is strategic across the city administration. This approach consistently uses positive messaging to develop an inclusive narrative for the city which informs and drives practice and is local authority led, working in close partnership with business, public and voluntary sector organisations to achieve shared goals.
