Talking Oxford: Bringing Together Town and Gown to Form a Stronger Community



A series of events, designed to forge closer links between University researchers and Oxford residents through discussions about the key

issues of migration, urban planning and inequality, is being launched today (Thursday May 18th) at the Kassam Stadium.

'Talking Oxford' will involve public meetings around Oxford to give residents and academics opportunities to share experiences of life in the town, and to understand how and why the city has become the place it is today. The four public events bring together academics and local people in discussions about Oxford planning, migration and history; musical performances and interactive theatre considering the future of the city.

The programme has been put together by Professor Bridget Anderson and Dr Nicola Headlam from the Centre on Migration, Policy and Society (COMPAS) at the University of Oxford. Bridget is a long-standing Oxford resident and Nicola a former Oxford City Council employee.

Professor Bridget Anderson said: "Even as a small city, Oxford contains the third highest ethnic minority population in the South-East, and 28% of residents are born outside the UK [1]. This makes human migration central to the lives and experiences of city residents, even if these experiences vary in different areas of the city."

Dr Nicola Headlam said: "Oxford is a unique place, where the high profile of the University can sometimes threaten to overshadow the identities of the people who live and work here. What we're looking to do is to get the people of the town – whatever their backgrounds - together to build a shared understanding of this place - from the hard realities of poverty, inequality and exclusion to what it means to be a proud Oxford resident."
